YOU WILL NEED:

- Scissors
- Flat work surface

AGE GROUP: 8 and up PROJECT TIME: 45 minutes

EACH PERSON SHOULD HAVE:

- 1 Self-Adhesive Picture Frame Front
- 1 Self-Adhesive Picture Frame Back Panel
- 1 Hank of Assorted Color Paper

The slotted quilling tools and the wood tools will be shared among the group.

NOTE: The slotted quilling tools and the wood tools are reusable!

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INSTRUCTIONS:

MAKE YOUR FRAME

- 1. On a flat work surface, carefully peel off the paper of the picture frame back panel with the sticky side up.
- 2. Carefully peel off the paper of the picture frame front. While holding the frame, flip over so the sticky side is facing down.
- 3. Without pressing down, line up the frame front over the frame back so that the sticky sides are facing each other and the edges match. Press together. Now you should have a framed panel with the sticky center exposed.

CREATE YOUR QUILLS

Most shapes in quilling are made by rolling thin strips of paper and pinching them into the desired shape.

You have plenty of paper in the paper hank to experiment with to make shapes See the guilling shapes chart for ideas to plan your design.

To use the slotted quill tool: Take 1 piece of the paper and slide the end into the slot. Roll the paper up. The tighter you roll it, the tighter the quill will be. Once you are done rolling the paper simply slide the "quill" off the tool.

To use the wood tool: You can use either end of the tool to roll up the paper on. When you are done rolling the paper simply slide the "quill" off of the wood tool.

CREATE YOUR DESIGN

NOTE: You can make all your guills first and then make your design or create the quill shapes as you go. It is your choice. This instruction is to create a basic quilled design, not a specific shape. If you want to make a specific shape in your guill design (flowers are easy) you can. While most quilling projects require glue, since you are pressing them into a sticky board, no glue is needed!

- 1. Start with 1 of your larger quills and gently press it wherever you want on the sticky panel. (refer to instruction photo as needed)
- 2. Add around your first guill, tucking in other guills and building your design.
- 3. Continue building your design until your panel is full of quills.

BASIC QUILLING SHAPES

Rolls: Begin with a loose circle and shape by pinching one or more sides.

Tight Circle: Wind strip onto tool as tightly as you can and remove.

Loose Circle: Wind strip onto tool. Loosen grip to allow paper to uncoil. Remove from tool. **NOTE:** The more you loosen, the bigger the finished shape will be.

Teardrop: Make a loose roll. Pinch one end between your thumb and index finger.

Marquise: Make a loose roll. Place between thumb and index fingers of both hands and pinch both ends. A shaped marquise is the same except while pinching both ends, twist one end up and the other down.

Square: Make a loose roll. Pinch into a marquise, turn and pinch opposite sides.

Loose Scroll: Make a loose roll leaving the end loose.

Open Heart: Crease the strip in its center. Roll each end in toward the center.

V-Scroll: Crease the strip in the center. Rolls each end toward the outside.

S-Scroll: Roll one end toward the strip's center. Then roll the other end toward the center to make an S shape.

C-Scroll: Roll both ends of the strip toward the strip's center.
